
Legal Response to COVID-19 Select Survey Findings

Between August 11 and September 1, 2020, the ABA Center on Children and the Law, funded by the Annie E. Casey Foundation, conducted a survey to solicit input on solutions to COVID-19 induced legal challenges across the country. The Center then analyzed the aggregate data for a national perspective on how jurisdictions are addressing the issues.


Survey Respondents


1,529 legal professionals in all 50 states and the District of Columbia

Attorney and Judge Categories*	
Children's Counsel	32.77%
Parent's Counsel	23.54%
Agency Counsel	11.45%
State Government Counsel	9.29%
Attorneys Whose Work Intersects with Child Welfare	9.55%
Judges	6.93%

Remote Hearings

Participants reported the following:

Advantages:

- Improved participation
- ✔ Barriers to transportation removed
- Increased collaboration between parties
- Increased flexibility with scheduling

Disadvantages:

- Noncompliance with statutory timelines
- Difficulty with client access/ communication
- Difficulty with feedback noise, poor recording quality and general confusion during virtual hearings



Technology Access

46% of participants reported the agency has provided funding to children, parents, and caregivers to pay for phones or internet to maintain contact.

50% report that their jurisdiction prioritized access to computers/laptops.



Relative/Kin Placements

30% report that upon entry into foster care, relative and fictive kin placements have been prioritized.



Mental Health Services

Participants report that mental health counseling has been the most prioritized service to address the needs of families.
