Anne. E. Dewey-Balzhiser (moderator)



Anne Dewey-Balzhiser served in executive level positions for much of her 29-year federal career. She specialized in financial institutions law, serving as the General Counsel of the Farm Credit Administration and the Office of Federal Housing Enterprise Oversight. She also served in legal capacities with the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency, and the Federal Trade Commission.

Her professional activities include serving on the Councils of the American Bar Association's Government and Public Sector Lawyers Division and its Section of Administrative Law and Regulatory Practice and as a liaison to the Commission on Women in the Profession. She has created several programs for the American Bar Association and authors *Career Corner* for the Government Division. She has been active in a number of organizations, including Women in Housing and Finance, the Michigan State University D. C. Study program, the Exchequer Club, and the Government Relations Committee of the PTSA at Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology.

Dewey-Balzhiser provides executive coaching, career counseling, and leadership training through her company (Women Lead LLC) and has taught a variety of business law courses online for Strayer University.

Dewey-Balzhiser is a 1972 graduate of the Honors College of Michigan State University. She graduated magna cum laude in three years and was elected to membership in Phi Beta Kappa. She received her law degree from the University of Chicago Law School in 1975. She is also a graduate of the American Banking Association's Stonier Graduate School of Banking. She is listed in *Who's Who in America*, *Who's Who in American Law*, and *Who's Who in American Women*. She is the mother of three grown children.

Judge Susan Burke



Judge Susan Burke has served as a state district court judge in Minneapolis, Minnesota since January 3, 2005. Judge Burke is the first and only Japanese American judge in Minnesota. On November 8, 2004, Judge Burke became the first Asian American initially elected to the bench in Minnesota.

Prior to her election to the bench, Judge Burke served as an Assistant United States Attorney for the District of Minnesota from 1994-2004. From 1992-1994, Judge Burke worked as a Trial Attorney for the United States Department of Justice, Civil Division, Federal Programs Branch in Washington D.C. She was one of approximately 30 attorneys hired through the Honors Program out of approximately 2,000 applicants in 1991.

While at the Department of Justice, Judge Burke was the first to litigate a case interpreting the John F. Kennedy Records Collection Act of 1992. She defended the FBI when Jimmy Hoffa's daughter sued the FBI to close its investigation of Jimmy Hoffa's disappearance. Judge Burke also litigated nine cases against Adam Walinsky and Ann Coulter.

From 1990-1992, Judge Burke served as a law clerk to the Honorable Paul A. Magnuson, United States District Court Judge for the District of Minnesota. Judge Burke is a 1990 graduate of the University of Virginia School of Law in Charlottesville, Virginia. In 1987, Judge Burke graduated third in her class from Hanover College in Hanover, Indiana.

Judge Burke was recently inducted into the Hanover College Athletic Hall of Fame for volleyball, basketball and softball. She was a two-time Academic All-American nominee, and was the only student to graduate with 12 varsity letters.

As an assistant city attorney, Jenae Naumann provides legal advice to all city departments on telecommunications, intellectual property, electronic communications, social media, public records, and information security issues. She also handles the negotiation, drafting, and reviewing of software and cable licenses, right-of-way use agreements, and cell site leases. She is a member of the cross-departmental Business Continuity Planning

Naumann's over twenty years of legal experience include being an in-house lawyer for Scottsdale, Arizona; a solo practitioner; an adjunct professor; a commercial litigator; and an Arizona Supreme Court law clerk.

Naumann has spoken on technology, RFID, privacy, ethics, diversity/inclusion and gender issues. She is currently treasurer of the ABA's Government and Public Sector Lawyer Division and the chair of the Membership Committee. She is also a member of the Copyright and Social Media Committee of the ABA's Intellectual Property Section and a member of the Information Security and Social Media Committee of the ABA's Science and Technology Section.

At the local level, Ms. Naumann served a three-year appointed term on the Continuing Legal Education Committee of the State Bar of Arizona and is a past chair for both the State Bar of Arizona's E-Commerce & Technology Section and the Committee for Minorities and Women.

Steve Vieux practices antitrust law with the FTC in the health care division of its Bureau of Competition. He investigates potential anti-competitive conduct in the health care and pharmaceutical industries. He is also a member of the Washington Bar Association, the D.C. Bar Association, and the ABA. He has served as treasurer for the WBA's Young Lawyers Division, and currently serves on the WBA's Board of Directors. He is also on the steering committee for the Antitrust and Consumer Law Section of the D.C. Bar Association.
