# Prescription for Criminal Justice Forensics

2:30-3:45 Session IV: **Update on DNA**

Law enforcement has taken a step outside the traditional realm of DNA databases by incorporating their own version of CODIS on a scale designed to fit their specific community needs. Generally, samples are collected from individuals charged with misdemeanors or low level felony offenses and held in regional DNA databases to be searched against local crime scene suspect samples. Law enforcement's perspective is that perpetrators tend to commit offenses within their own geographic location so more crime can be solved by searching local crime scene suspect profiles against local DNA databases. Administered by police departments, crime labs or prosecutor's offices, local DNA databases can often provide faster DNA hit information to investigators to both solve crime and prevent future victimization. Are these local DNA databases solving crime?

Is the investment worth the reality? Can automated rapid human DNA profiling instrumentation capable of producing a human DNA profile in 92 minutes, such as the Accelerated Nuclear DNA Equipment (ANDE) developed in a joint effort led by the

U.S. Department of Defense and supported by DOJ and DHS, be utilized in the field to obtain a suspect's DNA profile that can be immediately searched against a local DNA database? This panel of guests will discuss this new revolution in crime fighting.

4-5:15 Session V: **Peering into the Abyss: The Intersection of Technology, Identify Theft, and the Harsh Penalties That Apply**

Victims and targets of cyber crimes have a wide variety of forensic, technological and legal tools at their disposal. This panel will use case scenarios of recent cyber attacks to: survey current (and sometimes quite organized) invasive techniques and the weaknesses they exploit; identify criminal and traditional civil statutes that prosecutors and private victims can use to debilitate organized cyber criminals; and recommend "best practices" for enlisting the support of prosecutors.
