HÔTEL DE VILLE RECEPTION



BALANCING PRIVACY AND THE RIGHT TO KNOW IN OPEN SOCIETIES

Sponsoring Entity: Forum on Communication

Modern democracies all claim to be politically transparent. But in reality, even among democratic nations, the transparency of our legal system is all over the world map. Privacy law, including the right to publish court records or displays of affection in public places, criminal and civil codes surrounding digital protection, and injunctions against expression could not be more different on each side of the Atlantic. One notable example is the rise of European claims arising out of the Right to Be Forgotten, which provides claimants with the cause of action to compel information to be removed from the Internet. The concept is antithetical to the United States law, which holds that a claimant's reputation is measured across his or her lifetime, and that people always have the right to publish whatever they find in public records.

INTERNATIONAL CLIMATE CHANGE DURING TRUMP: CHARTING A REDUCTIONS PATH WITHOUT THE U.S.?

Sponsoring Entity: Section of Environment, Energy and Resources
Gathering at the scene of the multi-national agreement aimed to combat global climate change by reducing carbon emissions, the panel will discuss the legal framework of the Paris Accords, President Trump's decision to withdraw the United States and the process for withdrawal. The panel will address the legal implications and the potential impact on emissions, both from the U.S. withdrawal and the Trump Administration's broader efforts to undo U.S. climate policies and emission standards. While the Paris Accords and the first round of nationally determined contributions toward emissions will not stop the earth from warming, they are a critical first step and potentially a more important framework for further progress. Panelists will discuss the role of the U.S. federal government and the role that state and local governments, major corporations, and market forces may play in influencing U.S. greenhouse gas emission trajectories in the wake of federal withdrawal. The speakers will further explore impacts on the implementation of the Paris Accords.

CYBERSECURITY BEST PRACTICES IN ELECTIONS

*Sponsoring Entity: State & Local
Government Law*

Hacker attacks and other global cybersecurity threats have emerged as key concerns for election security and integrity. Equally problematic, interference in elections through propaganda, fake news, and social media manipulation has triggered alarm across the world. Experts from the Republic of Georgia, Germany and the United States will assess the effect of current cyber risks on the electoral process and provide recommendations for how these risks can be effectively managed in today's turbulent global environment. The experts will address: (1) the threat landscape, including identification of global cyber risks in the electoral context; (2) cybersecurity election infrastructure, law and policy, including creation, maintenance, and privacy of voter records and the mechanics of conducting elections; (3) political parties as recipients, targets or beneficiaries of cyberthreats, and the regulatory and policy framework needed for prevention; (4) cyber-risk management, investigation and enforcement across national borders, and intergovernmental cooperation and shared experience among different nations through election administration and law enforcement agencies; (5) cyber ethics and ABA Formal Ethics Opinion 477; (6) cybersecurity best practices in elections. The panel will discuss identification and management of global cyber risks and provide an overview of best practices developed by the U.S. Election Commission, NIST and other global organizations. The experts will focus on accountability and election security preparedness, securing election systems, and the role of contractors in providing governmental entities with reliable and secure equipment for elections. This program will provide critical insights into cybersecurity threats and how to manage them in key aspects of the electoral process, including election administration, voting machines, and counting and certification of votes and the complex issue of election integrity and its broader implications.

CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY AND PRACTICAL INTERNATIONAL LAWYERING

This program focuses on the practical and ethical aspects of advising clients involving in distribution networks, particularly regarding supply chain issues and their responsibilities regarding same. NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN INTERNATIONAL REPRESENTATIVE, CONSUMER AND CLASS ACTIONS

Sponsoring Entity: Section of Litigation
This program will discuss new developments

in International Representative Consumer and Class Action litigation. Recent record civil consumer settlements in the United States arising out of the VW emissions case are readily contrasted with European consumers' struggle to obtain relief under laws and procedures historically less advantageous to consumers than those in the U.S. Novel efforts in the Netherlands, Germany, U.K. and France to obtain relief for European VW emission victims may lead to changes which will affect consumer rights in Europe. Collective actions are relatively new and historically underutilized in Europe, with European consumers often unable to obtain relief. In an effort to give access to justice while avoiding abusive litigation, in June 2013 the European Commission adopted a non-binding "recommendation" to the effect that within two years, all member states would adopt mechanisms for "collective redress" which allow multiple claimants to seek relief on a collective basis and/or through a representative plaintiff. Speakers will discuss the current status of such efforts. In October, 2014, for example, new consumer protection laws deployed in France theoretically allowed consumers new means to seek and obtain relief on a class-wide basis. Though these provisions have been in force for almost three years, the class action mechanism has not yet broadly succeeded and at least two new bills have been made seeking to expand the scope of the original class action bill, and further revisions seem likely. Speakers will address unique challenges consumers face in England in light of its loser pays rules and Brexit. And speakers will compare and contrast VW claims in U.S., Germany, Italy and the Netherlands.

Globally, the rate at which online platforms for the delivery of legal services, many of which are not owned or operated by lawyers, grows unabated. They are the unstoppable force. Most are not subject to regulation or to the ethical responsibilities that lawyers owe to their clients and the public. This session will bring together providers, regulators, and lawyers for a lively conversation about those ethical responsibilities, including competency, confidentiality and independent professional judgment. Participants will explore whether and where consensus

exists for bringing these entities under the profession's regulatory tent, and how lawyers can ethically participate with them to take advantage of opportunities for serving clients. By the session's end we may see if the organized bar is willing to move away from its role as the immovable object.

This program will explore challenges to scoping and conducting corporate investigations that traverse U.S. and EU/U.K. regulatory and law enforcement frameworks. Using an interactive case study approach, the program will focus on differing—and often conflicting—approaches to the attorney-client privilege and work product protections in corporate investigations that span U.S. and EU/U.K. entities. Recent U.K. judicial decisions highlight the dramatically different approach to privilege between the U.S.

and the U.K., and serve as a backdrop for discussion on how to navigate those differences. The program will highlight additional considerations that outside counsel and in-house counsel alike must evaluate before embarking on complex cross border investigations, including: the impact of data privacy restrictions on evidence collection, witness interviews, and transmission of evidence across borders; labor law restrictions on employee discipline and other potential remedial measures; and strategies for self-reporting to law enforcement in different jurisdictions. The case study will draw on recent headlines that highlight these issues, such as the German authorities' raid on Jones Day law office to gather information in the Volkswagen investigation. The program will feature high profile panelists who represent the views of U.S. and EU law enforcement, in-house counsel for multinationals, and outside counsel who conduct cross border investigations.

ARE HUMAN RIGHTS AFFECTED BY TAX INFORMATION REPORTING AND DISCLOSURES?

Sponsoring Entity: Section of Taxation

Since 2001, new measures have been implemented to combat tax evasion and what some countries have determined to be undesirable erosion of the base of the taxes they imposed. The U.S. implementation of its Foreign Account Tax Compliance Act, the O.E.C.D. implementation of the Common Reporting Standard, and other measures in many countries around the world have greatly increased the volume of information available to tax authorities about the assets and income of individual and company taxpayers. Virtually every financial account and investment or commercial entity in the world is subject to some or all of these requirements. As part of these efforts, the exchange of tax information between and among various tax authorities has recently become the general norm. Little discussion has been had along the way to the related collateral consequences of the flood of information that is now available to many governments around the world about those who are otherwise subject to its laws.

Some nations around the world are not havens in any sense of the word. Repressive regimes, corruption and economic or geopolitical weakness and uncertainty have existed since before written history. Those who live, work, or operate businesses in such places, or whose family members live in such places, may face dire consequences, if they or someone with whom they are deemed connected falls out of favor with the ruling person or his or her political party or group.

It is of utmost importance that tax authorities enforce the law and bring to justice taxpayers who engage in fraud or unacceptable evasion. But such efforts can run counter to other broadly accepted values. The panel will discuss these conflicting objectives in the new world in which tax administrators are routinely required to divulge available portfolios of information on various individuals and companies. Experts in tax enforcement and financial privacy will join together to discuss these and related issues.

WHO NEEDS LAWYERS: TECHNOLOGY AND A.I. IN DISPUTE RESOLUTION

Sponsoring Entity: ABA Center for Innovation

The future of the lawyer in the era of ever developing technology and the use of artificial intelligence is hotly debated on both sides of the Atlantic. In the United States, the ABA generally has supported proposals for remote access to courts in order to overcome the excessive distances in some parts of the country between courthouses and the parties they serve. In France, the profession is confronting a series of proposals—some more far reaching than others—from the Government, which, if adopted, could enable remote access to judicial processes without the normal personal appearance before the judge. More controversial, however, some have suggested that disputes could actually be heard and resolved without the intervention of a human judge, based on databases composed of prior judicial decisions against which a computerized arbiter would compare the facts of the case in order to arrive at

a resolution of the dispute. The organized bar in France has reacted strongly to these proposals, which it believes would deprive parties of the effective assistance of counsel and other important rights. This CLE program will address these issues through the participation of two leading Paris lawyers representing the position of French avocats, and former ABA Presidents William Hubbard and Linda Klein representing the ABA's position, to discuss how the legal profession can adapt to these new technological challenges in dispute resolution.

BEYOND THE 30 ARTICLES: FUTURE ISSUES IN HUMAN RIGHTS

This session will take a look at human rights issues which were overlooked in 1948, but would be included if the Declaration were being drafted today. Includes a lively discussion with young lawyers and law students about where they see the protection of human rights going beyond the original 30 Articles of the Universal Declaration.
