

**Shay Bilchik** is the founder and director of the Center for Juvenile Justice Reform at Georgetown University's Public Policy Institute. The Center's purpose is to focus the nation's public agency leaders, across systems of care and levels of government, on the key components of a strong juvenile justice reform agenda. This work is carried out through the dissemination of papers on key topics, the sponsorship of symposia, and a certificate program at Georgetown for public agency leaders. Shay was the President and CEO of the Child Welfare League of America, a position he held from February 2000 to March 2007. Shay led CWLA in its advocacy on behalf of children through his public speaking, testimony and published articles, as well as collaborative work with other organizations. Before his tenure at CWLA, Shay headed up the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) in the U.S. Department of Justice, where he advocated for and supported a balanced and multisystems approach to attacking juvenile crime and addressing child victimization. Before coming to the nation's capital, Shay was an assistant state attorney in Miami, Florida from 1977-1993, where he served as a trial lawyer, juvenile division chief, and chief assistant state attorney. Shay earned his B.S. and J.D. degrees from the University of Florida.
